And with alle, and by thesse prynces, Her we our Roides and
Sunderdors, we do give and graunt liewed, by this our Charter,
unto the said new Lord Baltmore, his Heirs and assignes, and
to all the inhabitants and dwellers in the said province, and
both persons and to com to the said province, or to the said
or their shippes, factories, or assignes, all Merchandises, and goods
whatsoever, that shall com of the Howles and Commodities of
the said province, either by Land or Sea, into any of the ports
of our Roides and Sunders, in our Kingdoms of England,
or Wales, or shewshipe to dispose of the said goods in the said
ports, and if need be within and toward the said ports, and to unlade
of the same, to lade the said Merchandises and goods again
into the said ports or other shippes, and to export the same
into any other Countreys, without of our Dominion or foreign
going in Duty; with us, our Roides and Sunders, provided
alwaies that they paye such Customs, Imposicions, Sub-
sidies and Duttes, that the same, to us our Roides and Sunders,
shall paye as the best of our Subiects of our Kingdom
of England for the same going, shall be bound to paye.
And we will not that the inhabitants of the
said province of Maryland, shall by any way longer
And Sunders, of our most ample and speciaall
grace, certaint knowledge and utter intencion, we do give
the said Roides and Sunders, graunt unto the said new
Lord Baltmore, his Heirs and assignes, full and absolute
power and authoritie, to make ordres and Constitutes within
the province of Maryland and the yles an yllles therof, for
such and for many Searports,
