the way off: But doe you not heare what cracks their Bow-strings gine?

Many such pretty sayings hee wied in the time of his being with vs., and at his departure, hee thus express his extraodinary affection vnto vs.

I do lone the English so well, that if they should kill me, so that they left me but so much breath, as to speake unto my people, I would com-

mand them not to revenge my death:

As for the Natives, they are proper tall men of person; swarthy by nature, but much more by Art: painting themselves with colours in oyle, like a darke Red, which they doe to keepe the Gnatts off: wherin I consesse, there is more ease then combinesse.

As for their faces, they have other colours at times, as Blew from the nose youard, and Red downeward, and iometime contrariwise in great variety, and in very gastly manner sometimes; they have no beards till they come to bee very old, and therefore drawe from each side of their mouthes, lines to their very eares, to represent a beard; and this sometimes of one colour, and sometimes of another.

They weare their haire generally very long, and it is as blacke as Lett: which they bring vp in a knott to the left-eare, and tye it about with a large string of Wampampegg, or Roanoake, or some other of the best Levels a mong them. Vpon their fore-head, some

vie to weare a Fish of Copper, and some weare other figures.

About their neckes, they vieto weare many bugle chaynes, blew and white, and other colours; though these begin now not to bee effected among them for truck. Their apparrell generally is decreskin, and other Furre, which they weare like loose mantles: yet vnder this, about their middle, all women and men, at mans estate, weare Perizomata (or round aprons) of skinnes, which keepes them decently coursed, that without any offence of chast eyes, wee may connecte with them.

All the rest of their bodies are naked, and at times, some of the younger fortboth men and women haue inst nothing to couer them. Their secte are as hard as any horne, when they runne ouer prickles and thornes they seele it not. Their Armes is a Bow, with a bunch of Arrowes, of a yard long, sutnisht with three seathers at the top; and pointed either with the point of a decres horne, or a sharpe three-comer'd white slint; the rest is a small case, or straight slicke. They
