

WHEREAS, the Migratory Game Laws of the United States do not permit the shooting of wild ducks after February first each year; therefore

*Be it resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Congress of the United States be and it is hereby respectfully requested to amend the Migratory Game Laws of the United States, to permit the shooting of wild ducks within the State of Maryland until March first each year; and

*Be it further resolved,* That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded by the Secretary of the Maryland State Senate to the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and to each of the Representatives from Maryland in both Houses of Congress.
