Sec. 11. And be it further enacted, That this Act is hereby declared to be an emergency law necessary for the immediate preservation of the public safety and health, and being passed upon the yea and nay vote supported by three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, the same shall take effect from the day of its passage.

Approved April 3rd, 1922.

## CHAPTER 375.

An Act to repeal and re-enact with amendments Section 4 of the Charter of the town of Greensboro, as said section was enacted by Shapter 284 of the Acts of 1906, relating to the right of women to vote in the town elections in said town of Greensboro.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Section 4 of the Charter of the town of Greensboro, as said section was enacted by Chapter 284 of the Acts of 1906, be and it is hereby repealed and re-enacted with amendments to read as follows:

4. The male and female inhabitants of Greensboro, citizens of the State of Maryland and of the United States above the age of twenty-one years, who have resided in said town for at least six months next preceding the election and who are assessed on the tax books of said town with real or personal property to the value of at least one hundred dollars, or females whose husbands are assessed to the above amount, and all other male and female residents of said town possessed of the qualifications of citizenship, age and residence as aforesaid, who shall on or before the third Monday in March of each year pay to the treasurer or bailiff of said town a sum of money equal to the tax rate for that year on one hundred dollars, and receive a receipt therefor, and no others, shall on the fourth Monday of April annually, between the hours of one and five o'clock in the afternoon, at such places as the Commissioners of said town shall appoint, elect by ballot five persons, resident and qualified voters of said town and who shall be assessed on the tax books thereof with at least three hundred dollars' worth of property, as Commissioners of Greensboro, who shall hold their office for one year and until their successors are duly elected and qualified.
