

and thus furnish the example of a prompt, expeditious, efficient, effective, non-partisan and non-political session of the Maryland Legislature, having but the one object of disposing of the business which calls them together.

If changes of a permanent character seem desirable in the registration laws for Baltimore City, there will be ample opportunity for their consideration by the next general session of the Legislature. There is no need to consider them now.

The new registration days have been the subject of discussion by the Baltimore City Senators, the Baltimore City delegates, the Board of Election Supervisors of Baltimore City, the Attorney General's Department and myself, and I believe that all agree that the new days to be fixed should be Tuesday, September 16, Wednesday, September 17, Thursday, October 9 and Thursday, October 16, with revision day on Friday, October 17.

Accordingly, bills substituting these days as the new registration days and the new revision day for Baltimore City for this year only in place of the days now fixed by law will be submitted to both Houses of the Legislature.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

SENATE BILL No. 1.

A bill entitled "An Act to add a new section to Article 33 of the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, title 'Elections,' sub-title 'Registration,' the said new section to follow immediately after Section 29 and to be known as Section 29A of said Article, changing the dates for the general registration of voters and the revision of the registry books in Baltimore City, in the year 1930, and modifying the provisions with respect to the revision of the
