Sec. 5. *And be it enacted*, That whenever the profits arising from the silk culture, as aforesaid, shall be more than sufficient to defray the expenses thereof, such surplus shall be applied towards defraying the general expenses of the institution hereinbefore mentioned.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Arthur McCourt, of the City of Baltimore, be, and he is hereby divorced from his wife Elizabeth McCourt, *a vinculo matrimonii*.

CHAPTER 162.

Passed Mar. 5, 1839. *An act to divorce John Smith, of the City of Baltimore, from his wife Margaret Smith.*

Divorce

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That John Smith, of the City of Baltimore, be, and he is hereby divorced from his wife Margaret Smith, *a vinculo matrimonii*.
