CHAPTER S44.

Passed April 3, An act to incorporate the St. Michael's Silk Company, 1839. in Talbot County.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of
Maryland, That Joseph Bruff, James B. Way, Thomas Anld, John Harper, and such other persons as are
now or may hereafter become associated with them.

Shall be and they are hereby incorporated and made a body politic and corporate, by the name, style, and title, of the St. Michael's Silk Company, for the purpose of promoting the growth and culture of the mulberry tree, and the manufacture of Silk, and the prosecution of all such other operations as may grow out of or be

of all such other operations as may grow out of or be connected with the said business, and the said corporation; under the name, style, and title, aforesaid, hereby is invested with all the rights, privileges and power of the connected upon such companies, by an act, entitled an act, prescribing general regulations for the incorporation of manufacturing and mining companies, passed the twenty-righth day of March, eighteen hundred and thirty-nine, and is also hereby made subject to the

restrictions and regulations prescribed in said act.

Sec. 2. Jnd be it enacted. That the capital stock of said company shall not be less than five thousand dollars, nor more than fity thousand dollars, to he divided into shares of twenty dollars each, to he raised by subscription, and that said company shall have the right to purchase and hold land, not exceeding eight

hundred acres, in Talbot county.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That this act shall be in force from the passage thereof.
