Provisoes

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,*  
That William Brooke, be and hereby is entitled to the benefit of the insolvent laws of this State, without the requisition of the sixty days residence in said State, as prescribed by the laws thereof; *provided*, said William Brooke shall in all other respects comply with the insolvent laws of Maryland; *and provided also*, that said William Brooke shall be compelled to file his petition for the benefit of the said laws before the appropriate tribunal, in the city of Baltimore, before his discharge, and shall satisfy said tribunal that he did not come into this State with a view of obtaining the benefit of the insolvent laws thereof.

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CHAPTER 160.

Passed Feb. 13, 1840, *An act to divorce Ann Aulhouse, from her husband Lewis Aulhouse.*

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,*  
That Ann Aulhouse, of the city of Baltimore, be and she is hereby divorced from her husband Lewis Aulhouse, a mensa et thoro.

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CHAPTER 161.

Passed Feb. 13, 1840, *An act for the benefit of the Sheriff of Frederick County.*

Allowance for  
taking convict  
to penitentiary

Proviso

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the allowance or pay for taking a convict to the Maryland Penitentiary, from Frederick county, shall be twenty dollars for each convict, to be levied and paid as other county charges; *provided*, that in all cases, where more than one convict shall be taken at the same time, the allowance shall be fifteen dollars and no more, for each convict.
