SEC. 3. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be CHAP. 182. lawful for the said corporation to have a common seal seal for their use, and the same at their will to change, alter or make anew from time to time, as they may think best, and shall, in general, have and exercise all such General powers rights, privileges and immunities as by law are incident or necessary to corporations, and what may be necessary to the corporation herein constituted, and to enable the members of the said order to exercise all things concerning the design of this corporation, for the benevolent relief of the sick and distressed and for the promotion of their laudable purposes generally.

SEC. 4. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be Authority to lawful at any time, for the General Assembly to demand a statement of the amount of property, real and personal, belonging to the said corporation, and of the debts due to and from the said corporation, and the purposes for which disbursements shall have been made, and shall also have the right to authorise one or more persons to inspect such general accounts in the books of the corporation as shall relate to such statements.

SEC. 5. And be it enacted, That the General Assem. Right reserved bly of Maryland reserves the right to change, alter or annul this act of incorporation at any time.

An act to confirm and make valid a deed of conveyance Passed Mar. 20, from Joseph L. Smallwood to George S. Adams. 1838.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Deed confirmed. That the deed executed on the fourteenth day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, in Charles county, in the State of Maryland, by Joseph L. Smallwood, conveying to George S. Adams, of the county aforesaid, and his heirs and assigns, all the right, title and interest of him, the said Joseph L. Smallwood, of and in the real estate therein mentioned of him, the said Joseph L. Smallwood, late a citizen of the county and state aforesaid acknowledged before, and certified by George R. Spalding and H. A. Moore, esquires, two justices of
