

be admissible if procured by, through or in consequence of a search and seizure, the effect of the admission of which would be to compel one to give evidence against himself in a criminal case; provided however that nothing in this section shall prohibit the use of such evidence in Baltimore County in the prosecution of any person for unlawfully carrying a concealed weapon. *Provided, further, that nothing in this section shall prohibit the use of such evidence in Wicomico and Prince George's Counties in the prosecution of any person for a violation of the gambling laws as contained in Sections 288 to 307, inclusive, of Article 27 of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1939 Edition), sub-title "Gaming," or in any laws amending or supplementing said sub-title.*

SEC. 2. *And be it further enacted,* That this Act shall take effect June 1, 1951.

CHAPTER 711

(House Bill 769)

AN ACT to add a new section to Article 2B of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1947 Supplement), title "Alcoholic Beverages", sub-title "Restrictions upon Licensees", said new section to be known as Section 94A and to follow immediately after Section 94 of said Article, authorizing and directing the Comptroller to fix maximum discounts to be allowed by manufacturers or wholesalers of wines and liquors in the sale or distribution of the same and authorizing and directing the Comptroller to require the filing of schedules of prices and proposed price changes at which wines and liquors are sold by such manufacturers or wholesalers and by non-resident dealers.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That a new section be and it is hereby added to Article 2B of the Annotated Code of Maryland (1947 Supplement), title "Alcoholic Beverages", sub-title "Restrictions upon Licensees", said new section to be known as Section 94A and
