CHAPTER 364

(House Bill 616)

AN ACT to add a new section to Article 6 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland (1930 Edition), title "Caroline County", said new section to be known as Section 472A, to follow immediately after Section 472 of said Article and to be under the new sub-title "Refuse", providing that it shall be a misdemeanor to throw, dump, or deposit any trash, junk or other refuse upon another's property without the permission of the property owner, or upon any public highway in Caroline County, providing penalties for violations of this section and charging the State's Attorney of Caroline County with the strict enforcement of the provisions of this section.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That a new section be and it is hereby added to Article 6 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland (1930 Edition), title "Caroline County", said new section to be known as Section 427A 472A, to follow immediately after Section 472 of said Article and to be under a new sub-title "Refuse", to read as follows:

Refuse

427A 472A. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, dump or deposit any trash, junk or other refuse upon the land or property of another without the written consent first had and obtained of the owner thereof, or under the personal direction of such owner; or to throw, dump or deposit any trash, junk or other refuse upon any public highway of Caroline County, and any violation of this section shall constitute a misdemeanor and any person convicted thereof before a Trial Magistrate or Court of proper jurisdiction shall be punishable by a fine of not less than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), or by imprisonment of not less than ten (10) days nor more than thirty (30) days, or both. The State's Attorney of Caroline County shall be strictly charged with the enforcement of this section.
