

CHAP. 293. District court in this State, to enter satisfied, any judgment or judgments standing open upon the dockets of justices of the peace, that may have been, or shall hereafter be returned to the clerks' offices in this State; *provided*, the party so applying for such entry to be made, shall produce the receipt of the plaintiff or plaintiffs in the cause, attested by an acting justice of the peace, who shall be satisfied, before any such attestation, by the return of the fieri facias, or capias ad satisfaciendum, or other precept, that such money has been paid; and for such service, the clerks aforesaid shall be entitled to have and receive the sum of eighteen and three-fourth cents in each case, to be paid by the party filing such receipt.

CHAPTER 293.

Passed Feb'y. 13, 1847. *An act to incorporate the Proprietors of the Rose Bank Cemetery.*

Preamble.

WHEREAS, several citizens of Cecil county, in this State, hereinafter named, have associated themselves together for the purpose of establishing a cemetery at or near the Brick Meeting House, in said county, on a piece or parcel of land which a certain James Trimble purchased from a certain Cloud Pierson, containing one acre, one rod and thirty-five perches, and which said piece or parcel of land the said Trimble is desirous to have appropriated exclusively to the purposes of a public cemetery; and whereas, it seems right and necessary to provide for the permanence of the said establishment, so that those who bury there may be assured of perpetual protection to the remains of relatives and friends, and for the decent preservation of the grounds and improvements—Therefore,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That Amos Pierson, William McCullough, Elijah Pierce, Joseph Haines, and David Parker, and their successors be, and they are hereby created a body politic and corporate, by the name and title of the Proprietors of the Rose Bank Cemetery, and by that name shall have perpetual succession, and shall be able and liable to sue and be sued, in any court of law or equity, and may have and use a common seal, and the same at
