CHAP. 295.

An act for the relief of Joshua Deputy, John B. Price and G. Ross Veazey, securities for Edward B. Ford, late Collector of State Taxes for Cecil County, Passed March 8, 1847.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the time for the payment of the direct and income tax, and all taxes due the State for the year eighteen hundred and forty-five, by Edward B. Ford, late collector for Cecil county, be extended to the first day of January, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, the State reserving to itself all its rights and remedies against said sureties, notwithstanding the provisions of this act; and that no proceedings shall be had upon the bond of the said Edward B. Ford, late collector as aforesaid, until after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and forty-eight; provided however, that the said Joshua Deputy, John B. Price and G. Ross Veazey, securities as aforesaid, file their assent, in writing, to this bill, with the clerk of Cecil county court on or before the first day of April next.

CHAPTER 295.

An act for the relief of Antoinette Williams, late Antoinette McFadon, of the City of Baltimore. Passed March 5, 1847.

WHEREAS, by a deed, in the nature of a marriage settlement, duly executed by Antoinette McFadon and her intended husband John Hampden Williams, of the city of Baltimore aforesaid, bearing date on the eleventh day of June, in the year eighteen hundred and forty-four, certain property which then belonged to the said Antoinette McFadon, in her own right, was conveyed, in trust, to a certain Eliza Wilson, of the city of Baltimore aforesaid, for the uses, intents and purposes therein set forth; and whereas, the said Eliza Wilson refuses to act as trustee as aforesaid, and there is consequently no trustee to act in the premises; and whereas, since the date of the deed aforesaid, to wit, on the seventeenth day of June, eighteen hundred and forty-four, the said Antoinette McFadon and the said John Hampden Williams have become united in marriage, and the said Antoinette
