## CHAPTER 55.

An act for the relief of Richard T. Waters of Worcester Feb. 7, 1848.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Toretain slave That it may and shall be lawful for Richard T. Waters in this State. of Worcester county, to hold, retain, and keep in this State, as slave for life, a certain negro man named Levin, between eighteen and forty-five years old, who is now within this State; provided, that the said Richard T. Provisoes. Waters shall, within thirty days after the passage of this act, file with the clerk of Worcester county court, a list of said slave, with an affidavit thereto attached, that the same is a true and faithful list of said slave, stating his age, and that he has not been brought into this State for sale, and that he is a slave for life; and provided further, that the said Richard T. Waters shall pay to said clerk of said court the sum of fifteen dollars, to be paid over by said clerk to the Treasurer of the Western Shore, for the use and benefit of the colonization society of this State.
