

sion, eighteen hundred and thirty-six, chapter three hundred and nine, is hereby repealed, and that the said repeal shall take place on the first day of July next, and that the present officers be and they are hereby authorised and empowered to act in their respective capacities, until the aforesaid date, and that they are invested with full power and authority to collect all money or debts due the said corporation, and if there shall be any money remaining in the treasury at the date aforesaid, after first liquidating the debts thereof, the same shall be apportioned to the benefit of the citizens of said town, as may be directed by the burgess and commissioners.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted*, That all laws, or parts of laws, inconsistent with the provisions of this act, be and the same are hereby repealed. Inconsistent acts repealed.

CHAPTER 111.

An act for the relief of Joseph W. Hopkins, of Baltimore City.

Passed
Feb. 13, 1850:

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the commissioners of insolvent debtors, for the city and county of Baltimore, be and they are hereby authorised and directed to hear, consider and determine, the application of Joseph W. Hopkins, of Baltimore city, for the benefit of the insolvent laws of Maryland, in the same manner as if he had not applied for the benefit of said laws within the last two years. Have benefit.

An act to allow Kendal M. Jacobs, late Sheriff and Collector of Dorchester County, further time to complete his collections.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Kendal M. Jacobs, late sheriff and collector of Dorchester county, be and he is hereby authorised Authority to collect.
