CHAPTER 115.

An act to change the mode of repairing the public Passed Dec. 27, roads in Worcester county.

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of Overseers to Maryland, That it shall be the duty of the several collect fines overseers of the roads in Worcester county, to collect from persons neglecting to from persons neglecting to work on the public roads repair public in said county, the fines imposed by law for such ne- roads. How to glect, and with the money so collected, to hire persons be applied. to work on the roads over which they are overseers

respectively.

AND BE IT ENACTED, That if any overseer Overseers neshall neglect for two months to recover and apply as glecting to reaforesaid the fines imposed by law upon persons ne-said fines, shalf glecting to work on the public roads, such overseer forfeit to the shall forfeit and pay a sum of money not exceeding county. twenty dollars, and not less than five dollars, to be recovered by action of debt before a justice of the peace of the county, one half of which shall go to the informer, the other half to the use of Worcester county.

AND BE IT ENACTED, That the levy court of Levy court may said county shall be empowered to appoint as many appoint over-

overseers in said county as they may see proper.

AND BE IT ENACTED, That all laws relating Laws repugnant to roads in Worcester county inconsistent with this to this repealed. act be, and the same are hereby repealed.
