exceed one hundred and sixty thousand dollars, because the estimated length of it is about twenty miles.

Resolved further, That said delegations are urged to report said Bill as soon as practicable in order that this grand highway or boulevard may be quickly constructed for military and naval purposes for the defense of Annapolis, Baltimore and Washington, in case of a naval attack from the Chesapeake Bay, which "is practically without fortifications, and in time of war a public enemy would first of all seek the destruction of these two points, and over a hard-surfaced road, with the improved method of travel, assistance in time of strife could be easily and quickly gotten for the protection of either point," as set out in said Resolution No. 7 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1914.

[Which was read the first time and referred to Senators Duvall and Holmead.]
