Amendment proposed by Mr. Norris: "To add a new sub-section to the Bill, to be known as Section 5-A, and to read as follows: 'That the vote as provided for in the preceding sections as "For Prohibition" and "Against Prohibition," shall be divided so as to enable the qualified voters of Baltimore city to decide the question "For Prohibition" or "Against Prohibition" as a district separate and apart from the rest of the State, so that if the returns as submitted show that a majority of the voters of Baltimore city qualified under the laws of this State to participate in such elction have voted "Against Prohibition," such vote shall be conclusive as to the City of Baltimore. Then the laws relating to the sale, manufacture for sale and transportation for sale of alcoholic liquors for
