Also the following bills, endorsed "rejected," viz:

A bill entitled, an act to appropriate a sum of money to Richard B. Carmichael, Grafton L. Dulaney, and D. C. H. Emory, for their services as arbitrators under the act of December session, 1846, chapter 347, entitled, a supplement to an act for the relief of Passmore McCullough.

And the bill entitled, an act to allow E. A. Talbott, late Sheriff of Howard county, further time to complete his collections.
