Whereas, John Wilmot, Adjutant General of the State of Maryland, a good citizen and an efficient public officer, has been removed by death from his labors; the two Houses of the General Assembly deem it due to the State, that they should testify their regret for the loss, and their appreciation of his labors for his native State.
