Mr. Lecompte of Carroll submitted the following resolution: Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Adjutant General be and he is hereby directed to furnish to the order of John McCollum, captain of the Westminster Guards, forty-five knapsacks, the said John McCollum, captain of the Westminster Guards, first giving satisfactory security for their safe-keeping and return;

Mr. Pickell submitted the following:

Whereas, By an act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at December session, eighteen hundred and forty-one, chapter one hundred and thirty-five, it was enacted that from and after the passage of said act, a graduated reduction of tolls upon the National Road lying in this State, should be made by the superintendent of said road in favor of wheel carriages of various length of axles, so as to track within or outside of the usual length of axles now in use, viz: a reduction of one-third tolls in favor of all wheel carriages, whose track shall be clearly within the usual track of five feet; a reduction of one-half tolls in favor of all wheel carriages whose track shall be clearly outside
