

On motion of Mr. Gallagher,

The resolutions of the State of Illinois, respecting the remission of the fine imposed upon General Andrew Jackson, be referred to the consideration of the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Lecompte of Carroll,

Ordered, That the resolutions of the Legislature of Vermont, respecting the "fanking privileges and postages," be referred to a select committee of five.

Whereupon, the Speaker appointed Messrs. Lecompte of Carroll, Buskirk, Sherwood of Talbot, Tuck and Buchanan.

On motion of Mr. Graves,

Ordered, That so much of the resolutions of the Legislature of Georgia, as relates to the subject of repudiation and assumption of State debts, be referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

On motion of Mr. Kilgour,

Ordered, That so much of the resolutions of the Legislature of Georgia, as relates to free negroes, be referred to the committee on Colored Population.

Mr. Murray reported a bill entitled, an act granting further time to Benjamin T. Pindle, collector of county charges for the first collection district of Anne Arundel county, to complete his collections.

Mr. Tuck, from the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice, reported a bill entitled, an act to provide for the hearing, by the Court of Appeals, of the case therein mentioned ;

Which were severally read the first time.

Mr. Starr, chairman of the committee on Inspections, to which was referred the bill entitled, an act supplementary to an act passed at December session 1841, chapter 191, reported the same without amendment ;

Read the second time by special order, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Jarrett reported a bill entitled, an act requiring the Register of the Land Office, for the Western Shore, to correct an error in a certain patent therein mentioned.

Mr. Hammond reported a bill entitled, an act relating to Anne Arundel county ;

Which were severally read the first time.

Mr. Kilgour, chairman of the committee on Colored Population, made the following

REPORT :

The committee on Colored Population, to which was referred the petitions of Samuel Price, of Delaware, and David Kent, of Calvert county, in relation to the introduction of their slaves into this State, beg leave to report—that a total prohibition to the introduction of slaves into this State, either for sale or residence, was incorporated in the act of 1831, chapter 323, section 4 ; but that this restrictive policy was subsequently modified by the acts of 1833, chapter 87, and 1835, chapter 61. By the act of 1833,
