Mr. Winder asked and obtained leave to be excused from voting on the passage of said bill.

Mr. Hook submitted the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas this house have proposed to the senate to adjourn on the 20th instant, in which that body has concurred, and no measure of finance has been adopted to meet the exigences of the State; and whereas, the committee of ways and means reported on the 3rd day of March, a bill entitled, an act further to provide for the payment of the public debt of this State, and for the conversion of its sterling bonds into currency debt, which this house should act upon in time to allow the senate to deliberate thereon—Therefore,

Resolved, That the bill entitled, an act further to provide for the payment of the interest on the public debt of this State, and for the conversion of its sterling bonds into currency debt, reported by the committee of ways and means, be made the order of the day for Monday next, the 16th instant, and shall continue to be the order of the day until disposed of.
