Which amendments were severally read the first, and by a special order the second time, and severally assented to:

The said bill was then read through as amended, and placed in the

hands of the chair;

Mr. E. A. Lynch moved to withdraw the bill from the hands of the chair for the purpose of amendment,

Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. E. A. Lynch,

Said bill was amended by adding at the end thereof, as an addi-

tional section, the following:

Sec. 4. And be it enacted. That the said commissioners shall report annually to the treasurer of the Western Shore, a full and accurate account of the condition of the lottery system, as at present established, on the first Monday of December in each year, and shall exhibit a statement of their receipts, expenditures, and proceedings generally, to the same officer;

Mr. Orrick moved further to amend said bill, by adding at the end

thereof, as an additional section, the following:

Sec. 5. And be it enacted, That should the commissioners of lotteries, employ a clerk, his compensation shall not be less than six hundred dollars, and not to exceed eight hundred dollars per annum;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Sprigg, of Allegany,
