Whereupon it was declared that the Hon. John Leeds Kerr is duly elected a Senator to represent the State of Maryland in the Senate of the United States, until the 4th day of March, 1843.

The house then resumed the consideration of the preamble and resolution offered by Mr. Randall, and as amended upon the motion of Mr, Lecompte.

Mr. LeGrand offered as a substitute for said preamble and reso-

lutions, the following:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the practice indulged in by corporations of employing persons to visit Annapolis, with the view to control the representatives of the people in the discharge of their official duty, is a practice reprehensible in itself, and demands the repudiation of the representatives of the people: and that this General Assembly consider such employment, for such purposes, to be an insult offered to the people through their representatives.

Which was read.

On the question being put, will the house accept the substitute? it was

Determined in the negative. On motion of Mr. Le Grand,
