Mr. Coad, chairman of the committee on colored population, to which was referred the memorial of sundry citizens of Howard District, praying that the Legislature may afford protection to their negro property, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, asked leave to be discharged from its further consideration, and that it be referred to the committee on grievances and courts of justice;

Mr. Maccubbin, from the committee on colored population, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of William Brewer, of the city of Annapolis, praying the passage of a law authorising him to manumit a certain negro slave therein mentioned;
