So the bill was passed.

The house then proceeded to the consideration of the orders of the day, (the first order of the day) being the bill reported by Mr. Gaither, entitled an act to open a road from or near William Brown's barn, in Montgomery county to Clarksville in Howard District in Anne Arundel county;

Mr. Gantt, from the minority of the select committee, offered as a substitute for said bill, the following:

Whereas, by the act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at December session 1818, ch. 89, the county courts of this State are empowered to open, shut up, or alter any county road; and whereas, by the act of the General Assembly, passed at December session 1832, ch. 292, the county courts of this State, on application of any owner or owners of any quarry or mine, for a private road thereto, are empowered to open said road; therefore,

Be it resolved, That, in the opinion of this house, it is unnecessary and inexpedient to pass any law on the subject, and that the petitioners have leave to withdraw their memorial.

Which was read.

On the question being put, will the house adopt said substitute? it was

Resolved in the affirmative.

The said preamble and resolution was then read the second time, and assented to.

The house then proceeded to consider the second order of the day, being the bill from the Senate, entitled a supplement to an act entitled an act to incorporate the Trustees of the Poor of Baltimore city and county, and the amendments reported thereto from the committee on corporations.

Mr. Gallagher presented the preamble and resolutions of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore in relation thereto.

Mr. Graves presented a protest signed by the delegates from said city, against the said bill.

Mr. Randall rose and proceeded to make some remarks in relation to the bill before the house.
