

On motion of Mr. Dorsey,

Ordered, That he have leave to withdraw from the files of this house, the petition of sundry citizens of Howard District, counter to the petitions of sundry citizens of Montgomery and Anne Arundel counties, for a road therein mentioned;

On motion of Mr. Tuck,

Leave was granted the committee on grievances and courts of justice to bring in a bill, entitled an act relating to surveys in suits at law.

Mr. Matthews, chairman of the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made favorable reports upon the petitions of Mary McCracken, Elizabeth Wiery, and Dinah Patterson, severally praying for pensions, accompanied with the following resolutions:

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Treasurer of the Western Shore of Maryland, pay to Elizabeth Wiery, widow of Michael Wiery, of York county, in the State of Pennsylvania or order during life the half pay of a private in consideration of services rendered by her husband, during the revolutionary war.

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Treasurer of the Western Shore of Maryland, pay to Mary McCracken, widow of James McCracken, of Harford county, or order, during life, the half pay of a private, in consideration of service rendered by her said husband, during the revolutionary war.

*Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland,* That the Treasurer of the Western Shore of Maryland, pay to Dinah Patterson, or order, of Anne Arundel county, widow of Thomas Patterson, during life, the half pay of a private, in consideration of services rendered by her said husband, during the revolutionary war.

Which were severally read the first and by a special order the second time, the reports concurred in, and the resolutions therein contained, severally assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Pressman, from the committee on ways and means, made an unfavorable report upon the several petitions referred to them, praying that the banks of this State, may be allowed to issue small notes for a limited time;

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Wm. Lynch, from the committee on divorces, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of Sarah Roberts, of the city of Baltimore, for a divorce from her husband Samuel Roberts;

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Pressman, from the committee on grievances and courts of justice, to which was referred the memorial of Elizabeth Joice, of the city of Baltimore, praying for the repeal of the act of 1833, ch. 184, reported, that the committee having been satisfied that a bill of review had been filed under the act referred to, therefore report unfavorably thereon:
