

Mr. Maccubbin, from the committee on education, to which was referred the memorial of sundry citizens of Montgomery county, praying that the donations to the Rockville and Brookville Academies, in said county, be withdrawn, and that the annual amount heretofore given to said academies, may be added to the common school fund of said county, asked that the committee be discharged from the further consideration thereof;

On the question being put, upon discharging the committee from the further consideration of said memorial; it was

Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Graves,

Said memorial was referred to Messrs. Gittings, Gaither, Gott, and England.

Mr. Gaither, chairman of the committee on election and privileges, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying a change in the time of closing the polls in said county;

Which was read the first and by special order the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Graves, from the committee on education, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of sundry persons in reference to the appointment of commissioners for Williamsburg school, in Dorchester county;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, and concurred in.

Mr. Matthews, chairman of the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made an unfavorable report upon the order, requiring them to inquire whether the heirs of the late Major Alexander Roxburgh, an officer of the revolution, be entitled to any thing under the resolution passed by the House of Delegates, March 25th, 1779;

Which was read the first, and by a special order the second time, and concurred in.

Mr. Poultney, chairman of the select committee, made an unfavorable report upon the petitions of sundry citizens of Baltimore city, and the counties of Baltimore, Cecil, and Harford, relating to the protection of wild fow in the waters of the Susquehanna and its tributaries;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, and concurred in.

Mr. Jones, of Somerset, from the committee on crimes and punishments, made a favorable report upon the bill from the senate, entitled an act supplementary to the act, entitled an act concerning crimes and punishments, passed at November session, 1809, ch. 138;

Which was read the first time, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Paca reported a bill, entitled an act to protect the property in Kent and Queen Anne's counties, lying upon Chester river;
