

The bill, reported by Mr. Gallagaer, entitled an act to incorporate the Blacksmiths, Engineers, Machinists and Millwrights Society of Baltimore;

The bill, reported by Mr. Orrick, entitled an act to enlarge the fifth election district in Baltimore county, known by the name of the White House District;

The bill, entitled an act for the relief of James Percy, of Allegany county;

The bill reported by Mr. Gallagher, entitled an act to incorporate the Baltimore Hebrew and English Benevolent Academical Association; and

The bill reported by Mr. Nesbitt, entitled an act concerning the Franklin Rail Road;

Were severally taken up for consideration, severally read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Forman submitted the following message, which was read, assented to and sent to the senate.

*By the House of Delegates:*

February 26, 1841.

*Gentlemen of the Senate,*

We propose with the concurrence of your honorable to postpone the time for requesting his Excellency, the Governor, to attend in the Senate Chamber, to sign such laws as are engrossed, this day at 4 o'clock, until Monday next at 4 o'clock, P. M.

On motion of Mr. Prestman,

The house took up for consideration the bill reported by Mr. Leconte, from the committee on corporation, entitled an act to incorporate the Rose Hill Improving Company of Baltimore.

The Speaker announced that the hour had arrived for taking up the order of the day.

The house then resumed the consideration of the unfinished order of yesterday, being the bill reported by Mr. Bowie, chairman of the committee on ways and means, entitled an act for the general valuation and assessment of property in this State, and to provide a tax to pay the debts of the State;

On motion of Mr. Bowie,

The house again resolved itself into a committee of the whole house upon said bill, (Mr. Jones of Somerset being in the chair,) and after some time spent in committee, the Speaker resumed the chair, and the chairman reported, that the said committee had, in obedience to order, had said bill again under consideration, and having made some progress therein, had directed him to ask leave to sit again.

Which leave was granted by the house.

Mr. E. A. Lynch, chairman of the committee on internal improvement, reported a bill, entitled an act for the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio canal to Cumberland;

Which was read the first time, and ordered to be printed.

On motion of Mr. Keene,

The house adjourned until to-morrow morning, 9 o'clock.
