In times like the present, and so immediately after a great political revolution, in which the sentiments and characters of men who mingle in the duties of patriotism, have been brought to the touchstone of the people's scrutiny, I ought indeed to be profoundly grateful for the confidence and respect implied by this act of the General Assembly.

In deciding on an acceptance of this high trust, I am deeply impressed with the responsibility I assume; but I can at least promise to discharge the duties it may impose with diligence and fidelity.

So soon as previous indispensable engagements, and the necessary arrangements for leaving the Shore will permit, I will repair to Washington.

Be pleased to receive, gentlemen, for yourselves, the assurances of my high consideration and respect.
