Also, a bill, entitled an act, entitled a supplement to an act passed at December session 1839, chapter 146;

Also, a bill, entitled an act regulating the joint property of the city and county of Baltimore;

Severally endorsed, "will not pass;"

And delivered the following bills, originated in and passed by the Senate, viz.

A bill, entitled an act to authorise the Mayor and Councilmen of the town of Cumberland, to open a street in said town;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Coombs, Sprigg of Allegany, and Thayer.

A bill, entitled an act to divorce Ruth Smith, from her husband Samuel R. Smith;

Which was read and referred to the committee on divorces.

A bill, entitled an act to authorise Thomas Sater, late collector of Baltimore county, to close his collections;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Holmes, Randall and Welch, of Baltimore county.

A bill, entitled an act to lay out and open a road in Allegany county;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Thayer, Coombs and Sprigg of Allegany.

A bill, entitled a further supplement to the act to incorporate the Upper Marlboro' Academy, passed at December session 1835, ch. 204;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Tuck, Maccubbin and Bowie.

A bill, entitled an act to allow Wm. H. Fitzhugh, late sheriff and collector of Washington county, further time to complete his collections;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Nesbitt, Weast, Zeigler and Claggett;

And a resolution in favor of the heirs of Philip Smith;

Which was read and referred to the committee on internal improvement.

And, a bill, entitled an act supplemental to an act, passed at Dec. session, 1813, chapter 102, entitled an act relating to sheriffs and for other purposes;

Endorsed "amendments of the house, assented to with the proposed amendments," which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill returned to the senate.
