

Mr. Welch of Baltimore county, obtained leave to bring in a bill, to allow William Frush, and Peter W. Gibbons, of Baltimore county, further time to complete their collections;

Ordered, That Messrs. Welch of Baltimore county, Poultney, and Orrick, report the same.

Mr. Cathell obtained leave to bring in a bill to authorise the drawing of a lottery for the purpose of cleaning out the Pocomoke river, in Worcester county;

Ordered, That Messrs. Cathell, Hooper, Hearn, and Forman, report the same.

Mr. Le Grand reported a bill, entitled an act to revive an act, entitled an act authorising certain alterations in Baltimore county and city court rooms, passed December session 1817, chapter 7;

Which was read the first, and by special order the second time, and

On motion of Mr. Orrick,

Said bill was ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. E. A. Lynch, reported a bill, entitled an act to revive an act passed at December session 1834, chapter 205, entitled a further supplement to an act, entitled an act to authorise a lottery for certain purposes therein mentioned;

Mr. Stull reported a bill, entitled an act to incorporate the United Seminary in Carroll county; and

Mr. Morton reported a bill, entitled an act supplemental to the act passed at December session 1832, chapter 70, entitled an act to lay out and open a road in Cecil county;

Which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table;

Mr. Coad, chairman of the committee on colored population, delivered the following report:

The committee on colored population, to whom were referred the petitions of Samuel C. Broughton, Henry Thomas, Hamilton P. Moss, and William Lynch, beg leave to report, that they have had the same under consideration, and find that the prayers of the petitioners are severally provided for by the act of 1839, chapter 15.

The committee on colored population to whom was referred the petition of Thomas T. Moore, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to report, that so much of the petition as relates to negro Ann, she being a slave for life, is already provided for by the act of 1839 chapter 15; and that so much of said petition as relates to negroes Jacob and Jack, they being slaves for a term of years
