Which was read and referred to the committee on corporations.

Mr. Le Grand presented the memorial of Mary Dempsey, in relation to the application of her husband, Michael Dempsey, for a divorce;

Mr. Causin presented the memorial of sundry citizens of St. Mary's county, praying that time to complete his collections be granted to Abraham Welhelm, late collector of taxes in said county;
