On the question being put, will the house adopt the amendment as proposed by Mr. Causin? it was

Said bill was amended by striking out in the 1st section, second line, the words "passage of this act," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "first day of May next;"

Mr. Tall moved further to amend said bill by adding at the end

"Provided, That the corporation of Cambridge, shall be exempted from the operations of this act,"

Determined in the negative.

Mr. Graves moved further to amend said bill by adding at the end

thereon as an additional section, the following:

And be it enacted, That this act shall be so construed as to apply from the date of its passage to the issues of any such notes, scrip, notes, certificates or other devices, as are referred to in the first section; and that after the first day of August next, the provisions of this act shall apply in full force to any person or persons who shall emit, pass, pay out, deliver or circulate any such note, scrip-notes, certificates or other device, as a currency;

Which was read;

On motion of Mr. Heard,

Said amendment was amended by striking out "August," and in serting "October,"

The question was then put, will the house adopt the amendment as-

Resolved in the affirmative.

The said bill was then passed as amended.

On motion of Mr. Jones of Somerset.

(Seconded by two other members that voted in the majority) the house reconsidered their vote upon said bill;

On motion of Mr. Jones of Somerset,

Said bill was amended by striking out in the 1st section, 2d line, the words "passage of this act," and inserting in lieu thereof "1st day of May next,"

The question was then put, shall the said bill pass?
