

Mr. Maccubbin obtained leave to withdraw from the files of the house, the petition and papers of Zadock Robinson and others.

On motion of Mr. Paca,

Ordered, That he have leave to withdraw from the files of the house, the petition and papers of Josephine S. Elworthy.

Mr. Le Grand submitted the following message, which was read, assented to and sent to the senate:

*By the House of Delegates,*

April 5th, 1841.

*Gentlemen of the Senate:*

We propose with your concurrence to adjourn *sine die* on Tuesday, the 6th April, at 12 o'clock, M., and further propose with your concurrence to appoint a joint committee to wait on the Governor and ask his attendance in the Senate Chamber, at 9 o'clock, to-morrow morning, for the purpose of signing the laws. We respectfully name on behalf of this house Messrs. Le Grand and England, to wait on the Governor for that purpose.

Mr. Weems, chairman of the committee on inspections, reported a bill, entitled an act for the relief of David Greves and Cornelius Ryan, of the city of Baltimore;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time,

On motion of Mr. Graves,

Said bill was amended by adding at the end thereof as an additional section, the following:

And be it enacted, That the Mayor and City Councils of Baltimore shall have full power to exempt on such conditions as they may deem proper, any of the private wharves or part of any wharf, in the city of Baltimore, from the operation of the provisions of the act of Assembly to which this is a supplement, whenever the said mayor and councils may deem the interest of the people require such exemption.

The said bill was then passed as amended.

On motion of Mr. Le Grand,

The title of said bill was amended by adding at the end thereof the words "and for other purposes;"

The said bill was then sent to the senate.

On motion of Mr. Willis,

Ordered, That he have leave to withdraw from the files of the house, the petition and papers of Samuel Colston, late of Talbot county.

Mr. Tall, from the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of Elizabeth Barnett, widow of Peter Barnett, a soldier of the revolution, praying for a pension;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, and concurred in.
