By the Senate, December 28th, 1841.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

The Senate having organized by the election of the Hon. Richard Thomas as President, and Joseph H. Nicholson, Esq. as Chief Clerk, are prepared to proceed in the business of the session. We propose to sit from 11 o'clock, A.M. to 3 o'clock P.M., for the despatch of public business.

Which was read.

Said order was amended by adding thereto the following, "and that a sufficient number be furnished the house for the use of the members."

The question then recurred on the adoption of the order as amended, and being put,

It was determined in the affirmative.
