*the House of Delegates :*

The Treasurer respectfully states, that he has no source of information in the treasury, whence, in obedience to their order of the 24th, received last evening, he can report "the amount of State bonds in the hands of the Messrs. Barings of London—giving in separate statements, the amount hypothecated, and that waiting sale."

Of the \$3,200,000 issued for and delivered to the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road Company, in payment of the State's last subscription to the stock of that company and by the company confided to the Messrs. Barings for sale at limited prices, he has information of the sale of only \$23,333.73—and is not informed to what amount, if any, advances upon the credit of the stock have been received by the company in pursuance of their agreement with their said agents.
