"Provided that such cattle, sheep, hogs, &c., shall happen to be on the road by the default or neglect of the rail road company to enclose their road, and shall not be there by the neglect of the owner thereof."

Which was read.

On the question being put,

Will the House accept the said substitute?

It was determined in the negative.

The question then recurred on the adoption of the amendment submitted by Mr. Hammond;

And on being put,

It was determined in the negative.

Mr. Causin then moved to strike out the second section of said bill:

Before the question was put, On motion of Mr. Tuck,

Said section was amended by adding thereto the following:

"Provided such injury or damage shall occur in the day time."
The question then recurred on the adoption of the motion to strike out the said section,
