The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from some point on the National Turnpike Road, west of Cumberland, to intersect the Somerset and Cumberland Turnpike Road at or near the Pennsylvania line;

The Speaker announced that the clerk of the Senate had delivered on yesterday the following messages:

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:*

We have rejected the bill which originated in and was passed by your honorable body entitled, an act authorising the commissioners of Somerset county to condemn a public landing on St. Peter's creek in said county, at a place called Stump's Landing, the case being already provided for by an act passed at December session 1823, chapter 73, and an act passed at December session 1834, chapter 253.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:*

We have received your message, accompanied by the bill entitled, an act to suspend the running of the act of limitations in certain cases, which had been rejected by the Senate, asking a reconsideration of the same. The bill was rejected by the Senate after mature and deliberate consideration, and we see no good reason to recede from the action had thereon, and herewith return you the said bill.

The reason of the action of this body is, that the whole subject matter relating to our colored population is now before your honorable body upon the memorial of the slaveholders' convention, and instead of being acted upon in detached parts, can, if deemed necessary and proper, be embraced under one general bill.
