Webster, for his gallant defence of the battery committed to his charge during the attack upon the city of Baltimore in September 1814, and His Excellency the then Governor did not carry into effect the said resolution. This committee is unable to say why Governor Veazy did not act under the authority conferred upon him by the General Assembly, and inasmuch as the message of the late Governor recommends that some new direction be given for carrying the said resolution into effect, the committee would respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolution:
