Read the first time and referred to Messrs. Buskirk, Buchanan

and Shaw.

The bill entitled, an act for the benefit of Fulma Marcilly; Read the first time and referred to the committee on Colored Population.

And a communication from sundry citizens of the State of Illi-

nois, upon the subject of our relations with Great Britain;

Read and referred to the select committee raised on that subject.

The rule being suspended,

Mr. Crain presented the petition of sundry citizens of Charles county, praying an act to abolish magistrates' courts, so far as the same relates to Charles county;

Read and referred to Messrs. Crain, Brent and Matthews.

Mr. Boyle reported a bill entitled, an act to incorporate the trustees of Union academy in Carroll county;

Read the first and by special order the second time, passed and returned to the Senate.

The House then took up the following bills:

The bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act for the speedy recovery of small debts out of court and to repeal the Acts of Assembly therein mentioned;

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Armistead Beneficial

Society of Baltimore;

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Maryland Lyceum;
And the bill entitled, an act for the relief of Sarah Henrietta
Mayo of Anne Arundel county;

Said bills severally read the second time, passed and sent to

the Senate.

The rule being suspended,

Mr. Simmons presented the petition of sundry citizens of Frederick and Montgomery counties for the opening of a road therein mentioned;

Read and referred to Messrs. Simmons, Gittings, Gott and

Stalev

Mr. Tuck presented the petiton of forty-three citizens of Prince George's county, praying the condemnation of a sufficiency of land at Green landing for a public wharf;

Read and referred to Messrs. Tuck, Bayne, Maccubbin and

Hamilton.

Mr. Owens of Anne Arundel, from the committee of Ways and Means, reported a bill entitled, an act to aid the revenue by an additional tax on venders of lottery tickets.

Read the first time, and ordered to be printed.

The House then adjourned until half past three o'clock.
