

Mary Ann Maria Hubbard of the city of Baltimore from her husband William Hubbard, a vinculo matrimonii;

Read the second time.

Mr. Owens of Anne Arundel moved to amend said bill by striking out "a vinculo matrimonii" and inserting "a mensa et thoro;"

Determined in the negative.

The question then recurred on the passage of the said bill.

And on being put,

It was passed and sent to the Senate.

The House then took up the bill entitled, an act to change the judiciary system of this State and for other purposes;

Read the second time;

On motion of Mr. Carmichael,

The following amendments were read and assented to:

Add at the end of the 5th section the following, "and in the event of the death, resignation or disqualification of such chief justice in making an appointment of a successor, the Executive shall designate in the commission to the person appointed, his rank in said court."

Strike out the 9th section of said bill.

Insert in the blank in the 2nd line of the 13th section "two thousand."

Insert in the blank in the 4th line of the same section the words "fourteen hundred."

Insert after the word "State" in same line the following "but that nothing in this section contained shall be construed to affect any laws in reference to the extra compensation allowed to the judges of the court in Baltimore county, and that the same extra compensation now provided by law be continued to the district judge and the equity judge therein, and."

And strike out the word "that" in the same line.

Insert after the word "paid" in the 4th line of the 14th section "one half by the State and the other half."

Whilst the said bill was under consideration the clerk of the Senate delivered the following message:

*By the Senate,*

*March 3rd, 1842.*

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:*

We received your message requesting us to reconsider the bill relating to resumption of specie payments by the banks.

Since this subject has been under deliberation, the banks of the city of Baltimore have made a communication to the Legislature, (which is herewith transmitted.) This may be the means of reconciling all conflicting opinions, and lead to a concurrence in measures calculated to satisfy the public demands on this exciting subject.
