Which was twice read and concurred in.

Mr. Lynch reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to establish magistrates' courts in the several counties of this State, and to prescribe their jurisdiction.

Mr. Yellott reported a bill entitled, an act to authorise the commissioners of Harford county, to levy a sum of money for the use

of Thomas Magness, of Harford county.

Mr. Semmes reported a bill entitled, an act to enable William Becket, former collector of Prince George's county, to complete his collections.

Mr. Hopkins reported a bill entitled, an act to incorporate the trustees of the Deer Creek Harmony Church, in Harford county.

Mr. Walker reported a bill entitled, an act to appoint trustees for a certain church in Baltimore county, called Friendship.

And Mr. Ghiselin, chairman of the committee on Colored Population, reported a bill entitled, an act for the relief of George W. Arnold, of the city of Baltimore;

Which were severally read the first and by a special order the

second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Harris, chairman of the select committee, to which was referred the bill from the Senate, entitled, an act to authorise the commissioners of the town of Elkton, to survey and properly locate said town, reported the same without amendment;

special order, passed and returned to the Senate.
