Mr. Weber from the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice to which was referred the petition of sundry citizens of Dorchester and Caroline counties, praying the passage of a law, to prevent the sale of ardent spirits of any kind within one mile of the village of Federalsburg, unless the person or persons applying for a license to sell, shall first obtain the recommendation of two-thirds of the citizens of said village; asked to be discharged from the further consideration thereof.

On the question being put, on discharging the committee;

It was determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Hopewell chairman of the committee on Pensions and Revolutionary Claims, made a favorable report upon the resolution submitted by Mr. Semmes, on the 6th instant, in favor of George G. Coe, son of the late Richard Coe, a revolutionary soldier;

Mr. Hopewell chairman of same committee, made a favorable report upon the petition of Jacob Charles and son, of Caroline county, praying to be allowed a sum of money advanced to a revolutionary pensioner, accompanied with the following resolution:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer pay to Jacob Chares, the sum of thirteen dollars and thirty three cents, being the amount advanced by the said Charles, to Stephen Philips, a soldier of the revolutionary war;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, the report concurred in, and the resolution therein contained, assented to.
