Mr. Thomas, of St. Mary's, chairman of the committee on In-

spections, delivered the following report:

The committee on Inspections to which was referred the petition of John Sulivan & Son, also the petition of Birckhead & Pierce, both of the city of Baltimore, claiming compensation of tobacco fund for the storage of tobacco, have had the same under

consideration and make the following report.

That they have examined the claims of the petitioners, who represent that at different periods of the last year, they offered for inspection to the inspectors of the several tobacco warehouses in the city of Baltimore certain tobacco, which they declined to receive and store, alleging that there was no room in the ware houses for it, and in consequence of such refusal, the petitioners were under the necessity of providing suitable houses for the storage of said tobacco, which the petitioners represent, subjected them to charges for storage, drayage, laborers and insurance against loss by fire, which charges the petitioners allege should be paid by the tobacco fund.

By reference to the laws regulating the inspection of tobacco, the committee find that they make provision for the storage of all tobacco received at the ware houses, but the General Assembly not anticipating so large an increase in the inspection of this product, have omitted to provide a remedy for the grievance complained of by your petitioners. The State having taken the inspection of this product under its immediate supervision, your committee think that it is its duty and interest to furnish every facility for its inspection by investing the several inspectors with full authority to receive and accommodate all tobacco offered for inspection. The committee question however the expediency of acknowledging any claims which would virtually give to tobacco agents indiscriminately, the privilege of storing tobacco at the ex-
