Endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments."

Which amendments were twice read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Which was read and referred to the committee on Grievan-

ces and Courts of Justice.

A bill entitled, an act to allow William R. Trippe former collector of Talbot county, further time to complete his collections;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Thomas, of Talbot,

Arringdale and Bowdle.

The bill entitled, an act to extend the time of Thomas W. De Coursey, former collector of Queen Anne's county, to complete his collections:

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Earickson, Harrison

and Temples.

And, a bill entitled, an act relating to the justices of the magistrate's courts in Queen Anne's county;

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Harrison, Temples

and Earickson.

Mr. Semmes from the committee on Ways and Means, sub-

mitted the following resolution:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorised and directed to pay to Henry A. Callis of Prince George's county, the sum of forty-four dollars and seventy one cents, the amount of tax paid by him to the collector of the direct tax for Prince George's county, over and above the real value of his property as ascertained and settled by the levy court of said county;

Which was read the first, and by a special order the second

Mr. Potter moved to lay said resolution on the table.

Determined in the negative.

The question then recurred on assenting to the resolution.

Mr. Powder moved to amend said resolution, by adding at the end thereof the following:

"And all other persons of this State, who have paid State taxes, supposing them to be unjust."

Which was read.
