place of holding elections in the first election district of Anne

Arundel county, made a favorable report thereon;

second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Senate.

Mr. McKaig reported a bill entitled, an act to authorise Joseph Sprigg, to bring certain slaves into this State;

Which was read the first time, and

Referred to the committee on Colored Population.

Mr. Johnson, chairman of the committee on Ways and Means, reported a bill entitled, a supplement to the act entitled, an act to facilitate the collection of a portion of the tax, levied in pursuance of the act passed at March session 1841, chapter 23;

Which was read, and Ordered to be printed.

Mr. Johnson, chairman of the committee on Ways and Means, to which was referred the bill reported by Mr. Kilgour entitled, an act to tax the commissions of certain officers of this State, reported the same with amendments.

Which was read, and

On motion of Mr. Johnson,

Ordered to be printed.

Mr. Yellott, chairman of the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice, made an unfavorable report upon the order of the House, requiring said committee to enquire in to the expediency of so amending the laws regulating mortgages and bills of sales, as to require that they be accompanied with the oath or affirmation of the grantee or grantor.
