Resolved, That the members of this House have heard with deep distress, the melancholy information, that the Hon. Abel P. Upsher, Secretary of the Navy, the Hon, Thomas W. Gilmor, Secretary of War, and other eminent and distinguished citizens, have been suddenly killed and wounded by the accidental explosion of a gun at Washington, and being profoundly impressed with the magnitude of the loss which the country has sustained by this afflicting dispensation of Providence, and sincerely sympathising with the families and friends of the sufferers, as a testimony of the profound grief with which the intelligence has impressed them, do now adjourn until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

And the House accordingly adjourned until to-morrow morning nine o'clock.
