Gentlemen of the Senate.

We herewith return to your honorable body, the bill entitled, an act to regulate the issuing of licenses in the consolidated lotteries of Maryland, and respectfully ask that you will reconsider and pass the same. We deem it due to your honorable body, to state the facts which induced the House to pass this bill. The law of 1842, ch. 50, entitled, "an act for the more speedy completion of the consolidated lotteries, and the augmentation of the State's revenue from this source," provides that the commissioners of lotteries shall issue not less than forty licenses for the sale of lottery tickets. In the opinion of this House, the State's revenue would be increased by requiring as many licenses to be issued as there shall be applicants therefor, because each vender is required to pay \$250 for his license, and therefore the more licenses the more revenue.
